This collaborative effort builds on the topics studied in the course (migration, translation, adaptation, global inequality) and on semester-long class discussions on the role of media in addressing these topics.

by Ali Asgari, Farnoosh Samadi 2016


The Silence follows mother Cahide and daughter Fatma, Kurdish refugees in an Italian hospital about to get a diagnosis for the mother's unknown illness. Cahide's inability to speak to any of the hospital staff complicate the duo's ability to get a clear diagnosis. The film is overall very quiet, but underneath the silence are layers of emotional tension, intrigue, and dread.

by Amanda Strong 2018



AHALYA



PARADISE


